FAIRTRADE

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There are many older folk in our churches who recall the days when they dutifully bought the original fairly traded coffees as an act of solidarity and commitment to social justice, despite the grainy, unappealing taste. Over the past 10 years we have seen a revolution in Fairtrade with hundreds of high quality products now available. Church members have continued to be the quiet revolutionaries making what was once a practice for the committed few now a regular habit for the many.

With Fairtrade moving well beyond tea, coffee and sugar, there are now many Muslims who also see their support for Fairtrade as a way to ensure that their actions reflect their beliefs. Ramadan in particular, when hunger is a reminder of being part of a world when many go hungry every night, is a good time to reflect on where food comes from and who produced it. For a couple of years Woking Fairtrade help run a stall at the Shah Jahan Mosque enabling Muslims to buy Fairtrade dates with which to break their fast as well as Fairtrade olive oil from Palestine and Fairtrade honey as gifts.

The values embodied in Fairtrade of economic justice and solidarity with the poor and oppressed are ones which people of all faiths share. It would be great to see many of the churches with regular Fairtrade stalls reach out to the mosques near them this Ramadan and offer the chance to learn more about Fairtrade.

The Everlasting Flame Exhibition: Zoroastrianism in History and Imagination

11th October – 14th December 2013

Brunei Gallery, School of Oriental and African Studies , University of London.

The exhibition "The Everlasting Flame: Zoroastrianism in History and Imagination" provides a visual narrative of the history of Zoroastrianism from its ancient Iranian roots, to its emergence as the foremost religion of the Achaemenid and Parthian empires as well as its consolidation as the state religion under the Sasanians and the establishment of the great regnal fires.

The reach of Zoroastrianism into Central Asia and China and its influence on the major religions of Judaism, Christianity and Islam will also be demonstrated in the exhibition. From Iran to the west coast of India the story continues with the maritime journey of Zoroastrians and their settlement in India, their growth as an immigrant community under British colonial rule, and the later expansion of the modern diaspora.

The exhibition consists of a series of ten stories within the overall historical narrative that explores the fascinating ways in which Zoroastrianism has been imagined through the art, iconography and literature of non-Zoroastrians down the ages. Inside the exhibition artefacts, coins and silverware introduce the ancient and imperial periods of Iranian Zoroastrian history. Illustrated texts and manuscripts written in Avestan, Pahlavi, Persian and Gujarati languages show how the oral tradition was committed to writing during the Sasanian and later periods. The economic growth of the Parsi diaspora in India is demonstrated through paintings, porcelain, textiles, jewellery and furnishings from the nineteenth century and photographic materials will illustrate the grown of the later diaspora in Hong Kong, Singapore, the United States and Britain.

As well as the inclusion of important artefacts, the exhibition transforms areas of the gallery with spectacular installations. On approaching the gallery visitors will be confronted with a replica of the façade of the Yazd fire temple that will adorn the entrance of the building. A walk in fire temple, a central feature of the exhibition located on the lower floor of the gallery will consist of a prayer room, inner sanctum and ritual precinct where the yasna ceremony is performed. As outsiders are not allowed into fire temples in India this will be a unique opportunity for visitors. Other signature pieces include a reproduction engraved in glass of the British Museum's 10 metre cast of the western staircase from the palace of Darius at Persepolis, complete with the magnificent lion and bull motif. Finally, verses from the Gathas of Zarathustra will be presented as a series of large calligraphic panels and combined with voice recordings of the text to be presented as an audio-visual experience.

Godalming Quaker Meeting Room Tercentenary Celebrations

There have been Quakers in Godalming since 1655 and they met in each other's homes during the years of persecution from the start of Quakerism in 1652 until 1689 with the accession of William and Mary. In 1698 one of the members, Caleb Woods, a maltster, bought the Mill House. Four years later he also bought 'the tenement with the curtilage, barn, gate room, garden and orchard, known as Goreways'. By 1701 another Friend, John Cooper, was collecting for a Meeting House at Godalming, which money he handed over to Caleb Woods. Friends were already using the premises by 1709 when 'Jane Chandler of Brambley' was buried there. The premises consist of a long low building, the barn mentioned above but which was actually a stable and the more modern Meeting Room that dates to 1714.

The barn, now known at the Long Room, dates well back into the 17th century. The building built in 1714 is the building that will be 300 years old next year. This is where we hold our regular Meetings for Worship on a Sunday morning, business meetings, talks and other social activities. There are gardens to the front and back where almost 200 former Friends are buried, the earliest Friends being buried in the Old Quaker Burial Ground at Binscombe, formerly part of the farmyard of Resta Patching who sadly died following an imprisonment at Guildford.

The Meeting House is opened at the beginning of October each year on the Saturday of Heritage Weekend when visitors are told about the buildings and Quakerism in general.

There are plans for various events during 2014 but the only concrete one at present is having a special rose to commemorate the event. It is a white floribunda that will be called 'Quaker Light', white for Yorkshire, the county of the origins of Quakerism, and Light for the Quaker belief that there is an Inner Light of good (God) within each one of us. The rose will be available to order until the end of May at a cost of £8.50 each + postage. No money is required now as delivery isn't until late October/November 2014. The rose is virtually virus free and a strong grower, spread when mature approx. 3'0" x 2'6" high.

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Helping young people build a future / Guildford

Celebrating a new beginning

Dr Helen Bowcock, the High Sheriff of Surrey, delivered a moving speech at the opening of the new YMCA Residents' Development Suite on Tuesday 14 May. In the presence of residents, supporters and staff Dr Bowcock spoke eloquently of the plight of disadvantaged young people in Surrey and praised the work of the YMCA in turning young lives around.

Guildford YMCA has been raising funds to transform the lower ground floor of the Bridge Street building to create new facilities for its work with young people. Up to 40 16-25 year olds call the hostel home who would otherwise be homeless, and a Supported Housing Team work with them offering key working support, benefits advice and social activities. To date there has never been a space in the building that these young residents can call their own, but transforming a former conference room has given them an area for recreation, learning and group work.

All of this is thanks to the remarkable generosity of YMCA supporters and their contacts, many of whom were present at the opening. The Chair of Guildford YMCA, Pete Jeffrey and Tony Hennessey-Brown,



former Chair and now coordinator of the Capital Appeal, were glad of the opportunity to thank donors in person.

As funds allow, the remodelling of the building will move forward to also accommodate the YMCA's youth work department, Plantation. This is currently located off Market Street in Guildford and in recent years space has been at a premium as the number of projects being delivered has expanded. The Bridge Street development offers the opportunity to create a larger more flexible space from which to run a range of projects that enable young people to find direction in life.

Aaqil joined the BBC from Channel 4 where for more than six years he was Commissioning Editor for Religion and Head of Multicultural Programming.

Commissions include many award-winning and high-profile projects such as Saving Africa's Witch Children, The Qur'an, Inside The Mind of a Suicide Bomber, Christianity: A History and the religion strand Revelations.

This includes access information on places that are accessible to people with limited mobility, who are wheelchair users, to people with sight and hearing impairments and to people with learning difficulties.
